The States of California and Nevada Chapter of the National Association of Telecommunications Officers and Advisors ("SCAN")¹ oppose any changes to the Commission's current rules that would further limit local control over wireless facilities under Section 6409(a) of the Spectrum Act of 2012. The Wireless Telecommunications Bureau and the Wireline Competition Bureau (collectively the "Bureaus") should reject the three petitions from the Wireless Infrastructure Association and CTIA (collectively the "Petitions").

The Commission has already imposed significant constraints and burdens on how local governments may regulate the location and appearance of wireless facilities, particularly through 47 CFR 1.6100 (implementing Section 6409(a)). The Petitions appear aimed at further eroding local authority – in favor of private sector, corporate interests. SCAN supports the timely deployment of 5G wireless infrastructure, and SCAN believes existing Commission rules can accomplish that task. However, the Petitions cast local governments as an adversary – rather than a partner – of the carriers in seeking to achieve rollout of 5G wireless service.

Many local governments in California and Nevada welcome well-designed wireless facilities in their communities. Applications are often decided well within

the Commission's shot clock deadlines, and carriers can ably construct their wireless facilities. If the Commission placed further restrictions on all local governments, that may only serve to hinder cooperation between carriers and local governments, in the future. The Bureaus should decline to proceed on the Petitions.
